


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Welcome!

1) Submit a program evaluation for each program you wish to receive credit for within the conference app.



All fields in the evaluation and the request forms are <u>required</u>. Incomplete submissions will be deleted.



It's a difficult time to be a librarian, to put it mildly. Across the country, book challenges have increased by an order of magnitude. Anti-LGBT forces storm school and library board meetings demanding the removal of Pride displays. Storytimes face reactionary attacks, terrorizing children and parents. Legislators propose anti-speech laws that harm our community members and potentially criminalize our work as librarians. In academic libraries, harassment campaigns from reactionary forces can push people out of their jobs. This is the reality of what we're up against. How can we defend ourselves, our communities, and our values in this climate? How can we support each other to do work that matters?
